Brief Holocaust Timeline

January 30, 1933: Adolf Hitler appointed Chancellor

March 20, 1933: Dachau concentration camp opened

April 1, 1933: Boycott of Jewish-owned shops and businesses in Germany.

September 15, 1935: Nuremberg Race Laws.

November 9/10, 1938: *Kristallnacht* (nationwide pogrom in Germany).

September 1, 1939: Germany invades Poland, starting World War II in Europe.

June 22, 1941: Germany invades the Soviet Union.

September 28-29, 1941: Einsatzgruppen shoot about 34,000 Jews at Babi Yar, outside Kiev.

December 7, 1941: Japan bombs Pearl Harbor and the United States declares war the next day.

January 16, 1942: Germans begin the deportation of more than 65,000 Jews from Lodz

March 27, 1942: Germans begin the deportation of more than 65,000 Jews from <u>Drancy</u>, outside Paris, to the east (primarily to Auschwitz).

July 15, 1942: Germans begin mass deportations of nearly 100,000 Jews from the occupied <u>Netherlands</u> to the east (primarily to Auschwitz).

July 22, 1942: Germans begin the mass deportation of over 300,000 Jews from the <u>Warsaw</u> ghetto to the <u>Treblinka</u> killing center.

April 19, 1943: Warsaw ghetto uprising begins.

January 18, 1945: <u>Death march</u> of nearly 60,000 prisoners from the Auschwitz camp system in southern Poland.

January 27, 1945: Soviet troops liberate the Auschwitz camp complex.

April 29, 1945: American forces liberate the Dachau concentration camp.

April 30, 1945: Adolf Hitler commits suicide.

May 7, 1945: Germany surrenders to the western Allies.

May 9, 1945: Germany surrenders to the Soviets.

Brief Peoria Holocaust Memorial Timeline

2001: The Peoria Holocaust Memorial Button Project is begun

November 2001: First million buttons collected and counted

Buttons contributed from 48 states & 3 countries

April 2002: The 6 million buttons representing the 6 million Jews killed are counted

June 2002: The 5 million buttons representing the enemies of the state killed are counted

2003: Original Memorial is dedicated at the Shoppes at Grand Prairie

2014: Problems with the Memorial and changes at the site require its removal

More than 168,000 people per year visited the Memorial at its original location

2014 – 2017: Buttons are sorted and washed, new memorial designed & funds raised for its rebirth

May 5, 2016: Announcement of the Memorial's new location at the Peoria Riverfront Museum

February 20, 2017: Button sorting is completed

February 26, 2017: Groundbreaking at the new site

April 23, 2017: New Peoria Holocaust Memorial is dedicated at the Peoria Riverfront Museum
